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Numerous Realities and Ideas about Femininity in Uzbek and Russian Prose

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Abstract:

the article is about the real life of women in Russian and Uzbek literature of the 21st century, about numerous realities of female images, about heroines striving for self-realization and freedom from social restrictions, it tells how, despite all the difficulties of life, women retained their femininity. And also about images that reflect the complexity and diversity of women's experience.

We know that female characters in Russian prose were often tied to their roles in the family and society. They were often depicted as victims of their own circumstances or conditions, but they also often acted as strong, independent and self-sufficient individuals. For example, Tolstoy's heroines, such as Anna Karenina and Varvara Oblonskaya, represent different female ideals and clashes with traditional roles. Uzbek prose also has its own unique female characters, which are a reflection of the peculiarities of Uzbek culture, traditions and customs. Women in Uzbek literature are often depicted as guardians of the family and culture, showing their strength and devotion.

In traditional Uzbek families, women have specific roles and responsibilities. They are mothers and wives, as well as participants in public life. Most of the heroines observe moral standards, without violating the established sequence beloved - bride - wife - mother. Therefore, each social and role transition is accompanied by significant ideological, psycho-emotional increments in female images, enriching their inner world. As a rule, female images in literature are iconic, encoding entire eras in the history of their people. When comparing the heroines of Old Russian and Old Uzbek literature, the closeness of the ideal ideas of the peoples of Uzbekistan and Russia about a woman is revealed. Writers endow her integral character with traditional piety, tenderness, and hard work. Their life and destiny are realized mainly in caring for the family. However, it should be noted that not all images of women in Russian and Uzbek prose of the 19th - early 20th centuries were so bright and emancipated. Many works also contain typical idealized images of female heroines who obey social norms and expectations of society. Motherhood is an extraordinary feat, because they express their readiness to give everything for the health of their children, life, peace and happiness. These heroines can be depicted as faithful and submissive wives or unconditionally devoted mothers.

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
