He entered the literary world with his first collection of short stories, "Hikoyalar" (Stories), published in 1958. Following this, he released dozens of short story collections, including "Xatingni kutaman" (I Am Waiting for Your Letter), "Yurak so'zlari" (Words of the Heart), "Bolgar qo'shiqlari" (Bulgarian Songs), and "Qiyomat qarz" (The Debt of Doomsday). Through his works, he explored the depths of the human soul, acknowledged both physical and spiritual suffering, and portrayed the complexities of life. O'lmas Umarbekov was a writer who sought to understand the essence of a person, delve deeper into their inner world, and depict emotional experiences with an intimate perspective. As a result, his stories are imbued with sincerity and realism, encouraging readers to perceive the subtle aspects of the human psyche.

O'lmas Umarbekov also made a significant contribution to dramaturgy. In particular, in the 1970s, he became interested in theater and wrote plays such as "Oqar suvlar" (Flowing Waters), "Yoshlik dengizi" (The Sea of Youth), and "Komissiya" (The Commission). In 1994, he wrote the novel "Fotima va Zuhra" (Fatima and Zuhra), which was later adapted into a film directed by Bahrom Yoqubov in 2005. In addition, he was the author of screenplays for films such as "Sevgi afsonasi" (The Legend of Love), "Yigit va qiz" (The Young Man and the Girl), and "Changalzordagi ov" (The Hunt in the Jungle). His works bring each character to life, portraying emotions with true realism.

At that time, the detective genre was rarely explored in Uzbek literature, but his novella "Yoz yomg'iri" (Summer Rain) captivated readers with its intricate plot, intense development of events, and dynamic storytelling. The story keeps the reader engaged from beginning to end, with unexpected twists on every page, making it an absorbing read.

Analysis and Methodology of Literature

In a literary work, content and form are inextricably linked: one influences the other, and vice versa. Sometimes, certain aspects of a work can serve as both content and form. Therefore, content and form cannot be completely separated, as they are closely interconnected.

Content refers to the depiction of life scenes in an artistic work. In other words, literary and artistic works essentially reflect reality, various social issues, and human life and destiny. The content of a work embodies these truths and helps the reader gain a deeper understanding of life's realities. As H. Umurov states, "The depiction of a specific aspect of life in a particular work is considered its content" [5, 102].

First and foremost, it should be emphasized that form and content are closely related concepts. Form is the structure that embodies content, while an image serves as the form that expresses content. At the same time, an image is not only a form but also an essential part of the content, as the main idea of a work is conveyed precisely through images, which are created using artistic means of depiction.

Form serves as a means of expressing the content of a work and can only exist in close connection with content. The form of any artistic work should uniquely reveal its ideological content. An image is created through form and simultaneously serves to express content.

Therefore, it is not only an external structure but also an important factor that enhances the aesthetic impact of the work.

For example, when we talk about the form of the novella "Yoz Yomg'iri" (Summer Rain), we refer to its poetics, particularly its plot, composition, conflict, artistic language, and other elements. Thus, research on form leads to a true work of art—an artistic discovery—only if it enriches the content and reveals it more profoundly. In a genuine work of art, form and content must be in complete harmony. While content forms the ideological foundation of the work, form serves as its artistic expression. A work becomes appealing to the reader only when idea and artistry exist in unity.

Theme is a concept that determines the main ideological direction of a literary work, raising and exploring various philosophical, social, moral, and other issues. The events and phenomena that form the realistic foundation of the work are selected and depicted through the theme. In general, the theme represents the scope of events chosen from real life by the writer and reflected in the work, encompassing the important life issues addressed and illuminated in the text.

The theme is conveyed through the plot, and the plot serves to deeply and precisely reveal the theme. Another crucial aspect of the theme is that it binds different parts of the work into a coherent whole.

The idea of a literary work is the logical conclusion derived from the essence of the issues raised, the nature of the characters, and their interpretation. Therefore, theme and idea are closely interconnected, as the writer seeks to convey their thoughts about certain aspects of life to the reader. These thoughts are expressed through the actions of the characters and the issues explored in the work. After reading the work, the reader grasps the idea through the development of events and the fate of the characters. The more naturally and deeply the idea is embedded, the greater the artistic impact and emotional power of the work. As T. Boboyev states, "A literary idea is a generalized, emotionally expressive thought that lies within the content of an artistic work" [2, 102].

Just like the theme, the idea of a literary work is reflected in its content. In a true artistic work, every episode, every character, and even the smallest details serve to reveal the main idea. To fully grasp the idea of a work, one must carefully analyze the events, characters, and details depicted in it.

RESULTS

O'ltmas Umarbekov's novella "Yoz Yomg'iri" (Summer Rain) is a striking example of the detective genre in Uzbek literature. The novella was written in 1973. The plot begins when a tram driver and a passenger discover a dead body among the bushes. As the investigation unfolds, police officers and detectives undergo a challenging process to solve this mysterious crime. Throughout the novella, the psychological depth of the characters, their inner experiences, and human relationships are vividly portrayed.

The central character of the novella is Rahim Saidov, a senior researcher at the Institute of Experimental Plant Biology, a candidate of chemical sciences, and a highly responsible, hardworking individual. His psychological traits show that he is intelligent but extremely emotional. He strives to preserve his family but is overwhelmed by personal struggles that are difficult to understand. The problems in his family life lead to both emotional and physical exhaustion. His inner monologues reflect the struggle between personal needs and responsibilities.

Munisxon Saidova is Rahim Saidov's wife. She is the head of the French language department at the Tashkent State Pedagogical Institute of Foreign Languages. A 28-year-old beautiful and

intelligent woman, she has high expectations. She constantly seeks support, attention, and respect from her husband. However, her demands sometimes deeply affect Rahim Saidov's mental state, intensifying conflicts in their relationship.

Captain Sobir Aliyev is the police officer investigating the murder case. His primary task is to determine the cause of Munisxon's death, which he conducts in a professional manner.

Hafiz Abdullayev is Rahim Saidov's colleague and friend. He is always ready to offer advice and assistance to Rahim.

The novella's opening immediately compels the reader to deep contemplation:

"Murder! A drastic turn had occurred in Rahim Saidov's once-stable life. A horrific crime had taken his beloved wife too soon. Before the soil on her grave could even cool, fate struck the unfortunate man with yet another blow..." [4, 1]

DISCUSSION

At the core of the novella is an incident involving a tram driver named Munira and a railway worker uncle discovering the body of a woman. This event creates a mysterious and dramatic atmosphere from the very beginning of the story. Later, the focus shifts to Munisxon and her husband, Rahim Saidov, highlighting their marital relationships, conflicts, and misunderstandings. Munisxon's dissatisfaction with her husband, her unmet material needs, and personal desires are explored. Ultimately, tragedy unfolds: Munisxon is found dead, which further emphasizes the complexities of her life.

"Yoz Yomg'iri" (Summer Rain) is written in a traditional epic style, where narrative descriptions are intertwined with inner monologues. The plot develops in parallel lines: first, the mysterious death is depicted, followed by the details of Munisxon and Rahim Saidov's lives. This technique enhances the dramatic tension of the story and keeps the reader engaged.

From a stylistic perspective, the author harmonizes realistic depictions with psychological depth.
